individual is a part.

This view seeks a wider "we" attitude that is not limited to one primary ethnic grouping and to stretch the circle and test its limits in terms of its capacity to include more "we" groups. This is a centered set view.

The bounded set is a "set of people clearly marked off from those who do not belong to it." (Frost & Hirsch, The Shape of Things to Come). In Evergreen we are a bounded set marked by our various ethnic caucuses. In the centered set, "rather than drawing a border to determine who belongs and who doesn't, though some people are close to the center and others far from it, everyone is potentially part of the community and its broader sense" (Frost & Hirsch),

Japan Earthquake: Reflections, Observations and Hope—One Year Later News by Catherine Nold

Thank you for your gifts of more than \$460,000 to One Great Hour of Sharing "Japan Relief" to help [our] Japanese brothers and sisters in Christ after the 8.9 earthquake struck on March 11, 2011, followed by a devastating tsunami along the coast.

American Baptist International Ministries (IM) missionaries who have been involved in relief and rebuilding efforts are sharing their reflections and photos of the last 365 days. IM missionary **Roberta Stephens** recalls, "The first [financial] installments sent soon after the disaster struck were used as initial 'condolence gifts to Baptist related families who lost loved ones and whose

houses were partially or totally destroyed. This was money that helped many to stand on their own feet again."

IM missionary Lee Ann Hwang comments about life today in the disaster-affected areas [saying], "When we visited the temporary housing locations in Minamisanriku. 2 hours north of Sendai... the broken buildings and debris left by the tsunamis have been consolidated into neat mountains of garbage, piles of tires, and neatly stacked ruined cars. The city has been replaced with....nothing. While earthquake survivors were able to rebuild their homes and busi-

"The hand of the Lord was upon me, and he brought me out by the Spirit of the Lord and set me in the middle of a valley; it was full of bones. He led me back and forth among them, and I saw a great many bones on the floor of the valley, bones that were very dry. [The Lord] asked me, 'Son of Man, can these bones live?' I said 'O Sovereign Lord, you alone know..." — Ezekiel 37:1-3 (NIV)

As I experienced the poverty of Haiti this past week, the above Scripture came to my mind over and over. We used it as part of our evening reflection one night. Even though we went primarily to a part of Haiti less affected by the earthquake, the poverty and suffering was all around us. As we heard about the causes of the Haitians' struggle from missionaries Nzunga and Kihomi Mabudiga, the sense of despair started to creep in for me. Haiti no longer has any products which can provide income by export. Their government leaders allowed a devastating destruction of Haiti's trees which has led to massive soil erosion, and a greatly limited ability to grow crops. Garbage and pollution was on nearly every street corner and poured into the waterways and across the beaches. Disease comes not only from this publicly-disposed waste, but also from water systems compromised by the quake. Cholera, (though it has improved with education) is widespread. Around 60% of the children never finish grade school. On one expedition to an historic castle, I was guided by a young man who had been forced by necessity to quit school after the third grade. Much of the money he makes from being a guide goes toward school for his fouryear old sister. With all of this against the people, where is the hope? It seems, '[their] bones are dried up and [their] hope is gone..." (Ezek. 37:11.)

When Ezekiel said the original words, Israel was at the low ebb of their history as a nation. Babylon had wiped them out in a bloody war, and the survivors had been led away to captivity. Years later when they came back to the devastation still there, Ezekiel went to a valley where one of the battles against the Babylonians had been fought, and he saw the dead dry bones of Israel's vanquished army – their fellow-countrymen, and perhaps friends and ancestors. No wonder God invited Ezekiel to wonder if it was even possible to raise the nation from the dead. But Ezekiel gave a wise answer: "O Sovereign Lord, you alone know."

Just as some think Haiti can never again recover and be prosperous, my guess is there were plenty who said the same of Israel in Ezekiel's day. And much later in our own country's history, after the devastation of our nation's Civil War ... there were doubtlessly many who raised that question again, "Can these bones live?" And just before that war there were enslaved black people who had had their families torn apart and been sold into slavery...But in the midst of this devastation they sang a song based on Ezekiel's vision: "Dem bones gonna rise again!" We need to sing alongside the people of Haiti, "Dem bones gonna rise again!"

We cannot do it for them, but we

can work with those now in Haiti to bring and help implement a vision of hope. Already the Haitian Baptist Convention, from whom Evergreen received the invitation and our host through American Baptist missionaries Nzunga and Kihomi, is running a hospital, a much-used eve clinic, an orphanage, and at least one school. We assisted in the building of another school which Nzunga is determined to fill with quality teachers. We who went on this trip have seen the hope of these institutions as well. We have seen the hope in Nzunga and Kihomi, as Kihomi works with women bringing cholera education, as well as empowerment for women; and Nzunga works with the "Pigs for Kids" and "Kids [goats] for Kids" projects, where rural children can raise animals to help feed their families and earn money for their schooling. Through our work God is putting a new spirit in the old, dry bones of Haiti. The churches of the Evergreen Association have already given money to fan this flicker of light to flame. In the months and years to come, my dream is that we can do even more to keep this hope alive and help Haiti re -build, even as Israel did in Ezekiel's time.

Editor's Note: Evergreen hopes a 2013 mission trip to Haiti will enable you to be a part of the completion of the school, and other help for the people of Haiti. Determine to join us, or if you are not inclined to go, determine to financially assist someone else to be the presence of Christ among this hurting people. Stay tuned.
